

**SB 418 (2015 Legislative Session)** Addictive and Mental Disorders Division Mental Health Investments Reporting <u>Reporting Update for March 2016</u>

Subsection (2)(a): Provide Community-Based Care to support a community-based system of care that is demonstrated through increased utilization of community-based crisis intervention services to reduce short-term admissions to the Montana state hospital.
